### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum designed by the University of Kerala. The college also provides facilities for promoting co-curricular activities among students like NSS, NCC, games, athletics etc. In addition, career oriented programmes like B.Com (Hotel Management and Catering) is also offered. During classroom interactions, special importance is given to group discussion, power point presentation, student seminars and project works.

Periodical examination and tests are conducted to assess the progress of students. The University conducts 2 end-semester examinations every year. The institution conducts 2 test papers and 1 model examination before the commencement of university examinations. Student's improvement is also kept track of with the help of assignments, seminars and group discussions

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

The College encourages the teaching faculty to pursue research work. Students' research is made mandatory for all subjects. Whenever Seminars and Conferences are conducted, students are also encouraged as far as possible to present papers. Similarly, seminars conducted as part of club activities also give opportunities for students for paper presentations.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

Smart classes and ICT facilities are made available for the students of all departments.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College initiates several approaches for Human Resource management and for enhancing efficiency. The roles played by NSS, NCC and different other clubs are very significant. The daily work schedule ensures ample time for mind-body refreshing for students, teachers and office staff, which helps in improving efficiency. Proximity to a well functioning canteen, consistent fresh drinking water availability, power supply supplemented by solar power generator and library reading facilities are also intended for effective human resource management. The students are also provided coaching for competitive examinations and interview-training facilities. The Office staff is encouraged to take examinations in Manual of Office Procedures (MOP), and they are also provided computer training periodically. The teachers are encouraged to participate in Refresher and Orientation courses for career advancement and self improvement.

- Tight schedule associated with Semester System and the loss of working days caused by external factors.

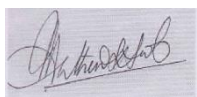

During the academic year 2014-2015, the following Action Plan was formulated

1. To make the activities of Blood donor's club more systematic.
2. To continue Mid day meal program
3. To publish college Journal –“Research Essence” uninterruptedly
4. To implement projects like WWS, SSP and FLAIR of the Higher Education Council, Govt. of Kerala.
5. To conduct seminars/workshops etc.
6. To continue the provision for clean drinking water, rain water harvesting and the mission of keeping the campus free of plastic.
7. To continue language proficiency training and ICT training for ministerial staff
8. To install an incinerator as a measure of reducing environmental pollution

#### Action Taken Report

1. A systematic record of students donating blood and details of beneficiaries is maintained. 108 students donated blood during 2014-2015.
2. Through Mid day meal program 33 students (18 boys & 15 girls) are provided lunch utilizing fund provided by Former Students Association.
3. Third volume of college journal Research Essence was published with 12 articles.
4. Selected students of the First year degree from various Departments are given opportunity to participate in WWS and SSP programs for the students. Four students from each Department and there by 40-students of the college were benefited by WWS program and 53 students through SSP. FLAIR is a training

program for the young teachers and three teachers of the college are benefited by the program.

5. 5 UGC sponsored National Seminars were organised in the college.11 Department level Seminars were conducted this year as part of seminar series Trendz. All the Departments participated in this seminar series .The seminar consisted of a forenoon session of invited lectures and an afternoon session of power point presentations by students.
6. One more water cooler added during this academic year.. Rain water harvesting program continued and the students use the harvested water through separate taps provided. Harvested water is also utilized in laboratories.

Students are given strict instructions to avoid the use of plastic in the campus. They are encouraged to pack food materials in tiffin boxes /banana leaves.

7. ICT training and classes on financial code and general administration given for the office staff. Language proficiency training to ministerial staff was continued by the teachers of English Department.
8. An incinerator, the 'Napkin Feeder' specially meant for incinerating napkins with a capacity of 250 per day was installed in the ladies rest room as a measure of reducing environmental pollution.

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
